## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - James Milne

As we head into the Easter break, I would like to reinforce with parents and carers the importance of keeping the communication lines open with your child/ren's teachers. If you have any queries or concerns, please don't hesitate to contact them directly. They are all available to meet with you to discuss their programs and the progress of your child/ren. You are also more than welcome to contact Jeff Brown, Garry Davis or myself and we are happy to follow up on your behalf as well as meet with you.

At the end of this week we will say farewell and thanks to Trish O'Dine. Trish has been our Aboriginal Islander Education Officer for 14 years and has supported students on both the Junior and Senior campus during this time. On behalf of the school community, I would like to wish Trish the very best and trust she will enjoy this next chapter in her life.

A reminder to parents and carers that the Easter break extends from Friday 30 March to Tuesday 3 April. Students return to school on Wednesday 4 April.

Parents and carers are also reminded that Term 2 begins on Monday 30 April. Our School Development Day is on Friday 11 May (Week 2). As an Independent Public School, Donnybrook District High School has the opportunity to schedule School Development Days on alternative days. This flexibility has allowed the school to secure a time to work closely with Dr Tim Lewis around Positive Behaviour Support. Dr Tim Lewis works with schools throughout the world to support the implementation and embedding of this key program.

### Donnybrook District High School Shines

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) has identified Donnybrook District High School as a school that has demonstrated substantially above average gain in student reading and numeracy achievement as measured by NAPLAN.

At the conclusion of each school year, ACARA measure students' performance from Year 3 to 5 and from Year 7 to 9 and release information to selected schools that have achieved outstanding results. It is genuinely pleasing to receive this information as it reflects the continual improvement that is taking place at both the Junior and Senior campus.

This is a wonderful achievement and should be celebrated by our school community.

### Carnivals

Both the Primary and Secondary students have been involved in various carnivals this term. The Primary students have enjoyed their Faction Athletics Carnival, taking part in Throws and Jumps and Track and Team Games on alternative days. The Secondary students participated in their annual Swimming Carnival on Wednesday 7 March.

Congratulations to the students for the enthusiasm and sportsmanship they displayed. This was most appreciated and a reflection of the strong character that exists throughout the school.

## ASSOCIATE PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - Jeff Brown

### Notices

Many thanks to Jeanette Hutchison for organising Harmony Day last week and to Jonelle McLoughlin for coordinating events between campuses. It was a great day and all students came away with a stronger understanding of their cultural heritage and the amazing opportunities offered to Australians through multi-culturalism.

I'd like to take this opportunity to praise the work of our current Student Representative Council. From raising money on the greatest shave day, supporting primary sports, and promoting positive behaviour. Every day it is a pleasure to have conversation with these students who engage in their own education and offer so much positive energy to our school community. Thank you!

Over the next few weeks we are focussing on positive behaviour around the school grounds and in particular on the verandas at recess and lunch. You will hear students talking about choices. This is because for those students not acting appropriately we are providing a choice: to behave appropriately or choose another appropriate action. Some students have difficulty with this and are finding themselves missing recess and lunch while receiving explicit lessons on appropriate choices.

I was pleased to hear that one of our students, Oceania Lyon has been selected to represent WA in the Nationals Australian Mounted Games Association horse riding event held in NSW and VIC. Oceania is competing in team events and pairs events. Mounted games is an equestrian sport involving a series of very fast races performed by a rider on their pony. It requires a high degree of athletic ability, good riding skills, hand to eye co-ordination and a competitive spirit which requires an ability to work together with other riders and to be willing to help one another. It also required a very well trained and highly skilled pony, which involves at least 3 months of pre training for peak fitness. (*Thanks to Salena Lyon for this information*) I would like to wish Oceania every success and enjoyment in the competition on behalf of the school.

### Homework

Parents of secondary students will notice we have again started the fortnightly homework focus. While this helps parents know what is expected each fortnight, it is important to ensure you do not take the responsibility away from your child. It is the student's responsibility to record assignments, assessments and due dates.

While there are varying ideologies, educationalists and authors that argue the benefits and non-benefits of homework, we have a school homework policy that provides a guideline to expectations for each phase of learning. If you think your child is receiving too much or too little homework please discuss with the relevant teacher. There will be some occasions where your child will not have set homework and this is an opportunity to do some revision, study and other extra-curricular activities. Teachers will be working with students over the next few weeks to remind them how to study, how to take notes, how to note key words and how to revise in a focussed and purposeful way rather than simply reading over their (often sparse) notes. Teachers have already advised students what sort of things they could be practising when there is no set homework. eg multiplication tables, spelling lists,.

Another useful practice at home is to set up a timetable or framework (perhaps like the ones below) on which parents and their children can sit down together and allocate particular times or days for homework, revision, study and extra-curricular activities. This should be displayed where your child can see it. For example: Fergal Spioney might discuss with his dad: "If I haven't been given specific set homework for that day I will use my time on Monday to study class notes in Science to answer some focus questions, on Tuesday I have football training so for only half an hour I will read a novel that interests me." And so forth. Both parents and children can see the timetable and know that something has time allocated each day. For parents who are concerned about their child having too much homework, decisions can be made regarding which demands have priority. As always, discuss concerns with the subject teacher.

As you will see there are many ways to set up a timetable which will differ depending on your circumstances and favoured learning styles.

I have also noticed many students are not using a diary. This may be on account of school diaries not being made available this year, but it is relatively easy to pick up a diary from the local newsagency, other stationary store or supermarket. It is good practice to develop the habit of using a diary to record upcoming assessments, assignments and events. While our fortnightly schedule helps us ensure that students are not overwhelmed or underwhelmed by homework, it is the student's responsibility to keep their own record of requirements. I'd like to see all students using a diary in Term 2.

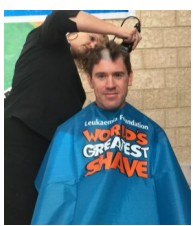


# Senior Campus News

On 21 March both campuses got together to celebrate Harmony Day. The day was full of bright colours and energy!

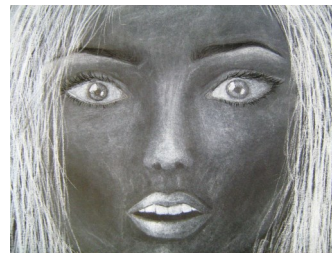
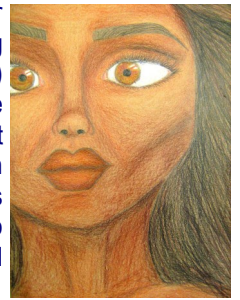
