Congratulations to all of the students who represented DDHS with pride, it was a very exciting and enjoyable day for all involved!



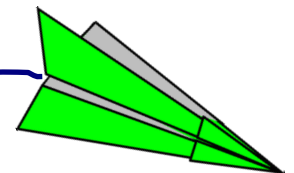

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - James Milne

Teaching is an exciting and sometimes overwhelming profession. Teachers are required to differentiate instruction to meet the needs of their students who enter their classrooms with a variety of academic and behavioural strengths and challenges. They are entrusted to deliver high quality instruction in an engaging manner and assess students' learning relative to the curriculum standards. To meet any of these demands, they must also support and manage student behaviour, which is probably one of the biggest challenges all schools face.

Researchers have spent decades identifying specific practices that allow teachers to create and maintain a positive, organised and effective classroom environment and Donnybrook District High School has adopted a framework that utilises evidence based practices to create a culture within the school that supports the teachers to be able to teach and learners to be able to learn.

Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) is our key approach to managing student behaviour throughout the school and establishing a climate in which appropriate behaviour is the norm for all students.

If you are not familiar with the expected behaviours we are focussing on then please take the time to look over our PBS Matrix that is attached to this week's newsletter. **Consider, Aspire, Respect and Engage (CARE)** are the core expectations for Donnybrook District High School.

To fully embed PBS within a school it takes approximately 5 years. It is a process that a school needs to step through in a sequential order with networks of support outside the school to make certain all the right boxes are 'ticked' before moving to the next stage/s. As a school we are 3 years into our journey and importantly making good progress in the key areas.

Important to the success of PBS is having strategies that recognise students for following the expected behaviours. This is about, 'catching' students who are demonstrating the appropriate behaviour. For some time now we have been acknowledging students who are meeting our expectations with a Faction Token. This system reinforces to the students (and their peers) that they are practicing the expected behaviour, whilst importantly providing instant feedback to them. We are now fine-tuning our system (with work still taking place) where both individual students and Factions have targets set and are working towards achieving these. Their achievements being acknowledged upon reaching the targets. Further information on this is being discussed with the students at assemblies and in

class.

It is important to note that PBS views inappropriate behaviour in the same manner that problems in reading or maths are viewed, as a skill deficit. When a skill deficit exists, we must teach the appropriate skills, which allow a unified and positive school climate to develop. This informs everyone that appropriate behaviour is a priority in the school.



For students who don't meet the expected behaviours as outlined on the PBS Matrix, the school has developed systems of support across both campuses. This too is crucial for the success of PBS. This may entail the students being withdrawn from class or losing a portion of their lunch break, to provide them with an opportunity to reflect on their behaviour and importantly discuss this with a teacher.

I would also like to take the opportunity in this newsletter to reinforce with parents and students that fighting, bullying, verbal abuse and harassment of others is completely unacceptable at Donnybrook District High School. Our classrooms and playgrounds must remain safe, productive environments that cultivate students and their learning. For this to happen, students must adhere to our **CARE** expectations. Parents of students who are involved in behaviour of this nature can expect their child to receive either an in school or out of school suspension. Thankfully for our school community, the percentage of students who predominantly fall into this category are minimal. The school has a PBS Committee that is working hard to embed this evidence based approach to managing student behaviour throughout the school. We are also working closely with the School Board to seek their input into this policy and associated procedures.

I hope everyone stays safe and well over the holidays and I look forward to seeing all the students back at school on **Tuesday 9 October**. Term 4 will no doubt be both exciting and busy. Accompanying today's newsletter is the Term Calendar highlighting a number of significant events. Please mark these dates on your calendars.

NAPLAN school readiness test

All NAPLAN tests in 2019 will be conducted online. In preparation for this, our year 7 students assisted with the NAPLAN School Readiness Test on Friday 7th September. The tests were designed purely for the school to practise using the ICT equipment needed and to ascertain that our network and devices will manage the test environment for the future. These current test results are not being used in any way. They were extremely well behaved and patient as we tested the ICT environment together. We had a large number of students away for this test and, as such, we may need to run the testing again in Term 4 to ensure that our ICT systems can cope. Donnybrook District High School Positive Behaviour Support - Poster Design Brief

Objective: What are we promoting - and why?

Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) is a process that enables schools to improve behavioural and academic outcomes for their students. A big focus of PBS is clearly communicating to students the behavioural expectations that they are required to follow at school. Students are explicitly taught these expected behaviours and how they apply to various settings around the school.

Donnybrook District High School is currently engaging in the process of implementing PBS. After consulting with staff, students and community members, we have devised four overarching behavioural expectations for all members of our school community.

All community members are expected to: **CARE**

Consider: Be considerate of others.

Aspire: Aspire to be our best.

Respect: Be respectful towards self, others, property and environment.

Engage: Engage in school activities and in learning

We would like to create a poster to be displayed around the school that clearly communicates these four expectations. Ultimately, posters may be needed for each individual expectation.

Target Audience: To whom are we promoting PBS?

All members of the school community. The poster will be aimed at students from kindergarten to Year 6 (ages 5 to 12) on our Primary campus at Mead Street, and Year 7 to Year 10 (ages 12 to 15) on our secondary campus at Bentley Street.

Response: What do we want them to think or do as a result of seeing our communications?

We would like the poster to be memorable so that students can recall our 4 behaviour expectations. We also want them to view PBS as fun, exciting and 'cool'.

Tone: In what tone of voice do we want our message to be communicated?

Positive, happy, fun, 'cool'.

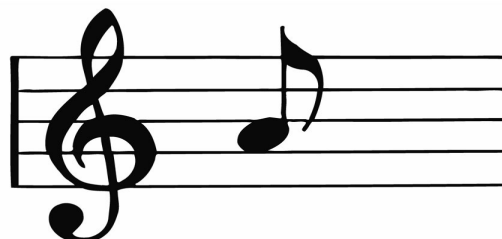

The GreenTeam is very excited to announce that we are now in partnership with Greenbatch, an organisation working towards building Western Australia's first plastic recycling facility. Greenbatch gives waste plastic a new life by reprocessing plastic bottles into 3D printer filaments. Although we as yet don't have a 3D printer in the school we have been included in the program as a pilot school. Underpinning this program is WA's brand new adoption of the 10c Container Deposit Scheme which is being rolled out soon. This exciting advancement for Western Australia will ensure we can run this program sustainably into the future. We have been fortunate enough to be given a bin to collect all PET plastic bottles with a number 1 on them. This includes water bottles, cool drink bottles etc. When the bin is full we'll take it to a collection point where the bottles have their labels removed then shredded down into flakes, followed by the separation of the lids from the bottle by using the different densities of materials to separate them using water (we will be the first factory in Perth to be using treated waste water).removing the glue from the plastic, the flakes are then melted down and are turned into 3D printing filament. We'd now like to encourage all students to start bringing in any bottles to place in the bin. For more information please check out the Greenbatch link

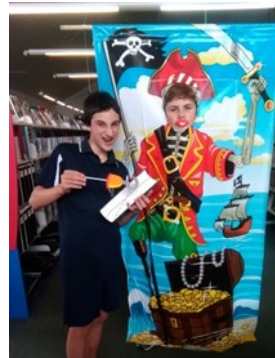

QUEENS CUP PERFORMANCE



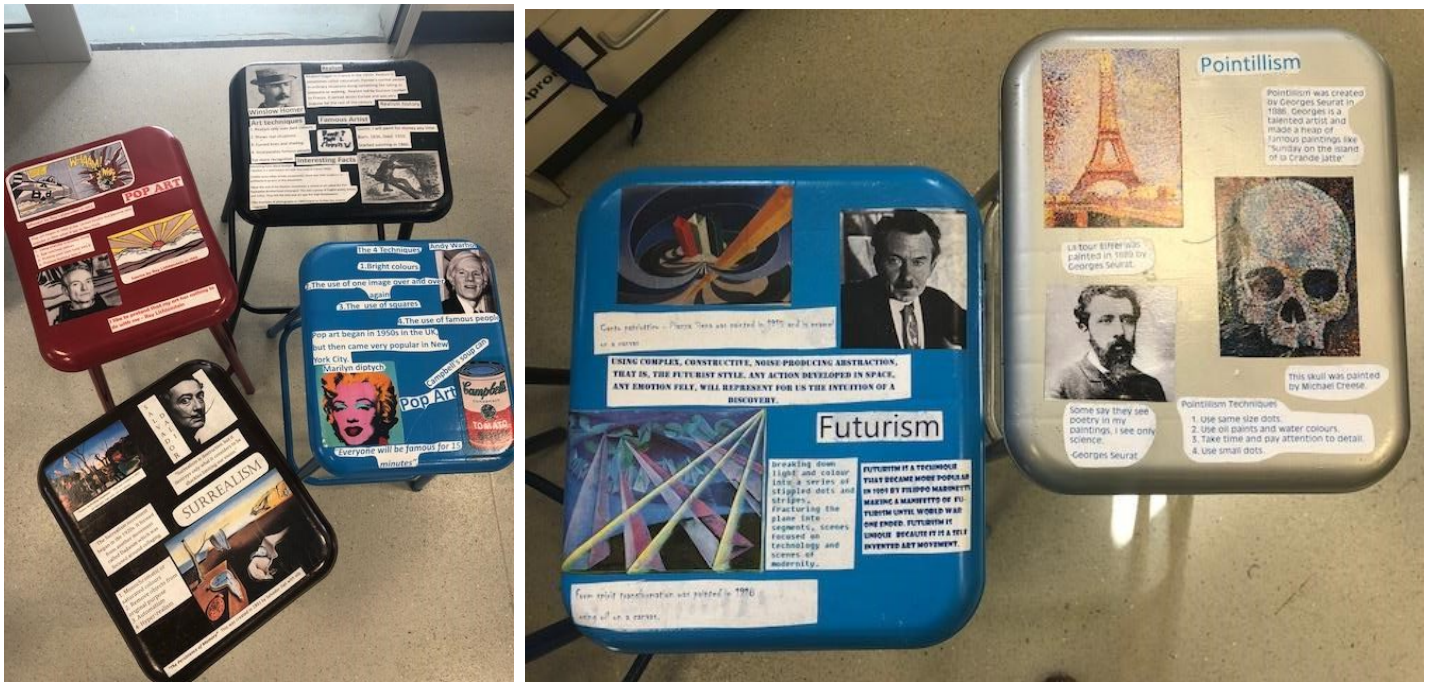

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FREE MENINGOCOCCAL VACCINE

There have been two recent cases of meningococcal W infection in children aged under 5 years who had not received their FREE vaccination.

Only 47% of children in this age group have received a meningococcal ACWY vaccine so far, meaning over 73,000 children in the community remain unprotected. Please make sure you book your child in for their FREE Meningococcal vaccine.

The free vaccines are for children 1-4 years old and also anyone between the ages of 15 - 19 years old. This vaccine will remain free until the end of 2018.

- Obtain a current signed medical history and consent for treatment
- Local anaesthetics are being used to anaesthetise your child/s tooth, we use local anaesthetics (needle) to make the filing process comfortable.
