PRINCIPAL'S REPORT - James Milne

Term 2 is well underway and I'm pleased to report that the students are working productively and tackling their learning with genuine interest and enthusiasm. I hope this continues throughout the remaining seven weeks as it will certainly support the achievement of positive outcomes and pleasing Semester 1 Reports.

This term is shaping up to be busy and exciting. A term calendar accompanies today's newsletter and highlights the many wonderful opportunities being offered to the students of Donnybrook District High School. Please keep an eye on this and make a note of dates and events that are particularly relevant to your family.



As you would be aware I returned from holidays to the news that Garry Davis had decided to call an end to his highly successful career. After 30 years in Public Education, Garry is ready to enjoy the next chapter in his life.

For the past 11 years Garry has fulfilled numerous teaching and leadership roles at Donnybrook District High School and in doing this he clearly demonstrated a genuine passion for improving the lives of our students. He will be dearly missed by our school community and fondly remembered for his honest approach and unwavering CARE he had for students, staff, parents and carers.

On behalf of the school community I wish Garry the very best and thank him for his tireless work and outstanding efforts over a long period of time.

Garry's retirement has triggered some changes that will take place both in the short term and the long term. I have advertised for a Primary Deputy Principal to replace Garry on the Junior Campus and the successful applicant will commence in Semester 2. In the meantime Jeff Brown will return for a couple of days a week and join Oonagh Smith in supporting me over the remainder of Term 2. Renee Reid and I are still working through details on how we will fill the Secondary Deputy Principal position at the Senior Campus. When this is sorted we will let the school community know.

Good Standing

This year every public school is required to add 'Good Standing' to its behavior policy to support addressing physical aggression and intent to harm that is increasingly being displayed in schools throughout WA. This is in line with the Minister's Statement on School Violence and efforts make certain our schools are safe places for learning.

Donnybrook District High School has also linked its 'Good Standing' model to our Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) program to address major and ongoing minor behavior infringements that are not necessarily physical in nature, but interrupt student learning and their wellbeing.

In collaboration with the School Board, Donnybrook District High School has formulated the following statement that will guide our decision making in the unfortunate event that violence is exhibited in our school or student behavior isn't meeting our expectations.

Good Standing supports the school in maintaining a safe and supportive environment for students and staff by adding additional consequences to students who demonstrate physical aggression, major and/or repeated breaches of the school's positive behavioural expectations.

These students will lose their 'Good Standing', for a period determined by the Principal or Associate Principal. For the period of loss of 'Good Standing', the students will be unable to attend extra-curricula activities deemed by the school as inappropriate to attend. These extra activities include but are not limited to: Graduations, Camps, Excursions and PBS Acknowledgements.

In the event that a student loses 'Good Standing' and they are excluded from extra-curricula activities, an alternative program will be put in place for them.

Overall Donnybrook District High School is a safe and encouraging environment, where students are well supported to learn, however like all schools, we are not immune from dealing with incidents. The school has an excellent Managing Student Behaviour policy that supports our school community and this can be viewed on the school's website. WACE changes - Year 10s

As your child in Year 10 will soon be commencing course selection for Year 11 in 2020, I am writing to let you know that the Minister for Education and Training has announced changes to the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE).

There will be an additional pathway for students starting Year 11 in 2020 to achieve the WACE - students can complete five Year 12 General courses, or a combination of General and ATAR courses, if they choose not do four or more Year 12 ATAR courses or a VET certificate II or higher as part of their program of study.

The new option provides greater flexibility and choice and is good preparation for students wanting to pursue a range of post-school options, including university entry, or training in a specialist area.

Transition to Year 11

Bunbury SHS and Manea Senior College, will be out to visit us in on Tuesday 28th May (Week 5) to talk to our Year 9 and 10 students about Year 11/12 options available to them in 2019 and 2020. Students have also been working with Mrs Duncan to put in Expressions of Interest at Manea and seeing what is available to them beyond Year 10. Most students should have some idea about what they want to do and have started a process of applying. We are here to help any student who hasn't yet decided or entered in to any enrolment process, so call in if you need some assistance with your child's future choices.

OLNA results

Round One results from the online Literacy and Numeracy testing were sent home to parents/carers via students last week. Students were also given a copy. For those students who haven't yet passed one or more disciplines, please be aware that you still have five more attempts over the course of the next 2.5 years. A lot changes in your learning over this time. As a school, we will further support students by offering intensive support for the first five weeks of Term 3 to those students who did not yet attain a 3. Please feel free to contact the school to make an appointment to discuss these results further with Mrs Hewton, Mr Fyfe or Mrs Reid.

Community Involvement

We are always keen to further our community involvement and we have been talking to Tuia Lodge about music performances, SRC visits and writing projects with residents telling their stories to students who then then turn them into a published article. Year 10 students and Business Certificate students are also seeking Work Experience at numerous places in town and we thank local businesses for their support. 


