NAPLAN

Congratulations to all the students in Years 7 and 9 who recently completed the NAPLAN assessments. Your dedication and hard work throughout the week have truly paid off, and we couldn't be prouder of your efforts. Upon receiving the NAPLAN results, our team of educators will conduct a thorough analysis of the data. This analysis will provide valuable insights into the strengths and areas for improvement of our students as a whole, as well as specific year levels within English and Mathematics learning areas.

Governments School Bonus

On the March 17 the Government announced a WA Student Assistance Program. During Term 2, parents will receive direct payments of \$150 for each child in Kindergarten to Year 6, and \$250 for each student in Years 7 to 12. This payment is not means tested. In April, the school will send you the required information to apply for the payment. Applications will open April 15, 2024.

Year 7 AdventureWorks

This term the Year 7 students participated in their first AdventureWorks program day. Throughout the day, our Year 7 students actively participated in a series of activities designed to foster teamwork, effective communication, and resilience. One notable activity involved collaborating to overcome challenges such as crossing a pit of "fiery lava" with limited resources, emphasizing the importance of teamwork and problem-solving. We believe that experiences like those provided by AdventureWorks are integral to the holistic development of our students. By providing hands-on opportunities for learning and growth, we aim to equip our students with the skills and confidence needed to navigate challenges both inside and outside the classroom.

Year 7 students will build on their learning when attending a three-day camp in Dwellingup on the 22 - 24 April.
