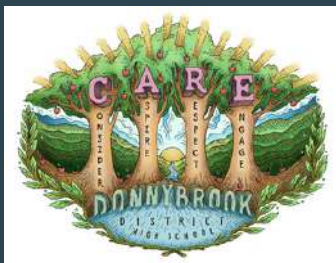
The weather was glorious and the effort, teamwork and sportsmanship of our students was outstanding. A great day was had by all and the Donnybrook White football team even came away with the trophy.

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

As Term 3 fast draws to a close, it really is incredible to reflect on what has taken place over the past 8 weeks and what is still to come in the final 2 weeks. I genuinely hope our school community is proud of all the opportunities our staff provide the students. Our teaching and support staff combine magnificently to ensure students from Kindergarten to Year 10 have a rich offering of experiences that engage them in their learning and importantly address their individual needs. I thank them all and applaud the effort they put in to make a difference through quality programs and a focus on student wellbeing.

Term 3 has been full of highlights, including interschool academic and sporting events, Book Week, assemblies, AdventureWorks workshops and camp, swimming lessons, excursions and incursions. Still to come is the much-anticipated Primary Celebration of Learning evening and the whole school Footy Colours Day on the final day of Term 3.

### **Celebration of Learning - Wednesday 17 September**

The Primary Celebration of Learning provides a wonderful opportunity for parents and carers, and extended family members to visit classrooms, view student work and chat informally with staff. Please mark this on your calendars and pop into the school to show your support.

### **2026 Structure and Programs**

Planning for next year is progressing well with an agreed class structure in place. This structure ensures class numbers throughout Primary and Secondary will remain well below the recommended sizes. This will continue to assist our teaching staff to create the conditions that better support students to progress their academic, behavioural and social and emotional learning.

We will be continuing to offer up an array of opportunities to capture students who require both revision and extension. Through small group tuition by teaching and support staff, we will target specific areas of the English and Mathematics curriculum.

Importantly we will continue to capitalise on the strengths of our staff, placing them in areas that are going to positively impact student learning and the programs that are offered across the school. I'm genuinely excited on how 2026 is shaping up and encourage parents and carers who would like further information on next year, to give me a call or pop in for a chat. I would welcome the opportunity to talk about your child and what we as a school will be doing to support him/her.

### **2026 Camp Program**

As part of our planning for 2026 and beyond, we are making changes to the camp program that has been in place for the past 3 years. We have secured 4 places at Mornington Adventure Camp (40 minutes from Bunbury) which provides the school with a purpose-built facility to conduct high energy and engaging outdoor education camps with students from Years 6-10.

Importantly there will be a continued link to social and emotional learning, with each camp having its own unique purpose. I look forward to providing parents and carers with further information around the program in the end of year packages.

### Voluntary Contributions

My sincere thanks to the families that have been able to contribute towards their child's schooling through payment of the voluntary contributions. These contributions (\$60.00 per Primary student and \$235.00 per Secondary student) are supporting a number of current projects that will enhance the learning environment for our students across both campuses. On the Junior Campus we have a permanent shade structure being built over a sandpit and an additional swing set being installed. On the Senior Campus we have been able to fast-track the purchase of two 3D printers to boost the offerings within our STEM-related courses. Without parent contributions across the school, projects such as these may sit in planning for considerably longer.

As a school we are focused on improving classroom and play areas and it is wonderful to know that family contributions play a key part in this.

### **Year 9 Camp – A Journey of Growth and Resilience**

The Year 9 camp was a truly memorable and rewarding experience, offering students the chance to challenge themselves, connect with their peers, and grow in ways that extend far beyond the classroom.

Throughout the week, students faced a variety of physical challenges, from rafting down an icy river at dawn to tackling long treks and outdoor activities, yet the greatest challenges were not only physical. The camp pushed our young people to show resilience, adapt to unfamiliar circumstances, and step outside their comfort zones. In the beginning, some students hesitated to lean on others, but as the days unfolded, they discovered that trust and teamwork were essential. They learned to be vulnerable, to listen to one another and to share their strengths. Slowly, bonds of trust and respect formed, and the group grew into a team. Watching this transformation was nothing short of inspiring.

Leadership emerged naturally as students recognised opportunities to support one another. Whether it was taking the lead in a group task, encouraging a friend who was struggling, or celebrating achievements together, our students showed that true leadership comes from compassion, courage and collaboration.

Socially, the camp was just as powerful. New friendships were forged, existing ones deepened and students developed a richer understanding of one another. With only a few weeks left of the term, we wish all our students well in their final assessment tasks and encourage them to keep being the best versions of themselves.







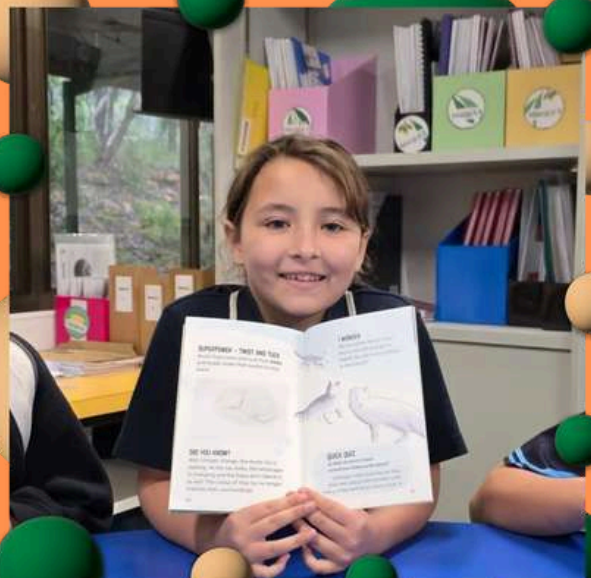




In MacqLit this semester we have been enjoying our new series of books. Students have been very enthusiastic about group reading and have had the opportunity to choose between fiction and non – fiction books. Generally, at the end of a Macqlit Lesson each group will read aloud for 10 - 15 minutes. The purpose of this reading time is to assist students to apply the isolated skills that they are learning during our sessions.



This semester with the assistance of some of our amazing EA's, we are introducing Reinforced Reading with some of our Macqlit students. Education Assistants listen to the students read aloud twice a week, first a challenging text, then a text that they can practise their fluency and expression on. Students are loving reading and expanding their vocabulary and knowledge on all sorts of books from Working Dogs, Volcanoes, Animal Migrations and the most popular, Ancient Egypt.

# EMU IN THE SKY



In Australia, the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are recognised as the first astronomers. Among other things, they use their knowledge of the night sky for food gathering and navigation purposes. However, instead of focusing on the position of the stars to form the constellations, Aboriginal astronomy focuses on the whole of the sky, including the dark patches between the stars. They see the connections between the sky and the land, viewing them as one entity.

Our Year 5 students were introduced to a story about the night sky called 'Emu in the Sky' as told by an Aboriginal person.

The Emu in the Sky is one story that is familiar to many Aboriginal communities across Australia and relates to a particular constellation. As shown in the video we viewed, the shape of the Emu is formed from the dark patches in the Milky Way and almost stretches across the whole sky.

Aboriginal people relate the position of the emu in the sky to the breeding behaviour of the emu on the land. From the position of the emu, Aboriginal people know when it is time to harvest the emu eggs for food.

Between March / April and July / August, when the emu in the sky is visible across the entire sky and is orientated diagonally with the head up, the emus on the land are laying their eggs and sitting on their nests to incubate the eggs.

This observation is important because it indicates to the Aboriginal people when the eggs can be collected for food.

With AIEO and teacher guidance, the students:

- Explored the ways Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people gather and use observations of the night sky in spiritual, physical and cultural connections to Country.
- Developed an appreciation and respect for the knowledge, stories and understandings of the night sky from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.
- Gained an appreciation of Noongar language through learning the words for:

**emu (waitj)**  
**sky (worl)**  
**star (djinda)**
